What Happened at the April Elmswood Surgery Patients' Participation Group Meeting

The PPG welcomed Dr Chanelle Blackwood to the group and to the Surgery itself.

Sarah Collis and Suzanna van Schaick introduced Self Help UK, an organisation, and registered charity, that started in Nottingham and has been going for nearly 40 years. Self Help groups now have an international profile. Sarah has been Chief Exec for 10 years.

The aims of the organisation is on three fronts: Groups, Individuals and Service Providers. Both the vision and aims of SHUK are around empowerment of people to control their health and well being and to promote and support a national self-care agenda within the health and social care sectors. Currently there are about 300 separate groups in Nottinghamshire

Sarah outlined many different modes of this self-care agenda being worked out in practice. There is a Nottinghamshire Handbook which is updated and published annually. It is then distributed to all GP surgeries, libraries and other places. An on-line version is also available. There is also a phone number, 0115 911 1662 and there is someone there to actually speak to. One of the important ideas is about people being in contact with people, and it starts with the organisation itself. At the moment there are 15 people at the head office on Hucknall Road Nottingham.

A group can be set up and it can apply to SHUK for initial funding. There is a process of making a bid and SHUK will help with the application process, offer training and award finance. There is £10k available every year to help start self-help groups.

The underlying idea is that people with the same condition meet together and this meeting opens up the way of combating isolation and being able to see that people are getting on with their lives as fully as possible. Feedback is that people have less fear and anxiety and feel better about themselves. Also the social contact leads to people being more active resulting in fewer visits to GPs. Groups can be led by both health care professionals and non professionals. Innovate locally, replicate nationally!

In addition SHUK undertakes research on behalf of other organisations, such as MacMillan Cancer Support.

It was appreciated by the meeting that this was a very good organisation and that it was doing excellent work both locally and nationally.

Nottingham and Nottinghamshire KEEP OUR NHS PUBLIC (KONP) campaign

Public meeting **Wednesday 17th April** 7pm with Guest Speaker: John Lister (Journalist, academic, editor of Health Campaigns Together newspaper & website) Venue: Mechanics Institute North

Sherwood St NG1 4EZ. In less than 3 years new systems to reorganise the NHS, and make £ billions of savings, have gone through 3 sets of terminology, from 'STP' to 'ACS' to at present 'ICS'. A Long Term Plan for the NHS has just been published which identifies over 60 'aspirations'. More cuts & privatisations are planned. Despite much handwringing, mental health services are getting harder & harder to access. Social care is becoming more & more inaccessible, & only then with rising charges. Public health services – the key to preventable medicine and demand – are also being cut after being transferred from the NHS to cash starved local authorities. By the time our meeting takes place the future of the NHS Treatment Centre (the newish building at the back) will be known.
